Objective

Structure/Content

- 1. Historical context using primary resources
 - Interpreting the historical relevance, people and events leading to the Declaration of independence
 - The document and its impact on the people of United States and the world
 - Encourage focus on events in Midwest and St. Louis

Lectures and discussion with academic experts and historians.

Resources - Digital, books, periodicals, excerpts from the declaration, letters and documents of the said period.

2. Creative expression of art through learning

- Education on various artistic mediums, tools and innovation.
- Explore art styles prevalent during the time of independence and modern art.
- Workshops provide exposure on recent art trends, digital aids, copyrights.
- Art to inspire American principles of equality, freedom and pursuit of happiness

Workshop for specialized knowledge in art and its medium.

Classroom instruction, personal guidance, feed-back and mentoring.

3. Activities

- Sessions involving classroom and in person.
- Group sessions for interaction, exchange and collaboration of ideas and knowledge.
- Places for artist to relax and time for reflection.
- Dining with peers to share, support and social.
- Final day exhibition for the public and interaction with artistes.
- Sales, silent auction of created art etc.

- 7-day free retreat for 20 participants spread in 3 weeks.
